This increase in the per fill supply limit will reduce both gaps in medication continuation and unintended pregnancies while improving pregnancy timing and spacing. In turn, this improves contraceptive equity and health outcomes while lowering direct costs of pregnancy management.

Family Planning Clinic Providers

Dispensed oral contraceptives, vaginal rings, and contraceptive hormonal patches may not exceed a 12-month supply.

Pharmacy Prescription Coverage

Contraceptive prescription drug claims should be billed at point-of-sale directly to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) contracted Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM). These medications will be subject to other existing Fee-for-Service (FFS) pharmacy policies and coverage limitations, including refill thresholds and prior authorization (PA) requirements.

Medicaid Health Plan pharmacy coverage of these products will continue to fall under the Managed Care Organization (MCO) Common Formulary, consistent with bulletin MSA 15-55 and the updated supply fill limit established in this policy.
