I. Call to Order and Roll Call

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. and asked the clerk to take the roll. A quorum was present. Representative Robinson joined the meeting shortly after roll call was taken. There were no absent members.

II. Approval of the March 6, 2019 Criminal Justice Policy Commission Meeting Minutes

The Chair asked members if there were any additions or corrections to the proposed March 6, 2019 CJPC meeting minutes. There were none. **Commissioner Hilson moved, supported by Commissioner Kaminski, to approve the minutes of the March 6, 2019 Criminal Justice Policy Commission meeting as proposed. There was no further discussion. The minutes were approved by unanimous consent.**

III. Data Subcommittee Update

The Chair called on Grady Bridges for an update. Mr. Bridges proceeded with a review of the results from the last meeting. Next, he provided an analysis of the three most common Class E felonies by age, race, and gender. See attached handouts for more details. Senator Lucido raised several questions regarding the effect more populated counties had on recidivism as it relates to OWI-3rd, the relevancy of race, and the difference in jail time between black males who retained counsel and those who had court-appointed attorneys. Judge Stutesman commented on the low number of cases used to make observations, particularly for white females under 30, in the Cases by Age, Race, and Gender charts found in the handouts and urged that it is made clear that these charts are for crimes convicted not necessarily committed and the offender's habitual status is not factored in due to possible plea agreements. A discussion of ways to make this clarification followed. Mr. Bridges continued with his presentation and provided an explanation of the updated results found on each of the remaining slides. In response to a question raised by Commissioner Kubiak, Mr. Bridges explained how the information presented at today's meeting can be incorporated into the full report. Commissioner Verheek asked if any thought had been given to how the prior record variable (PRV) might impact some of the results and Mr. Bridges responded that the data does look at the PRV and compares the prior record level. He then provided further details of what will be included in the Class E report. A discussion of taking a similar look at specific crimes that are predominant in Class D followed.

The Chair offered his thoughts about the effect trauma that occurs within the first six months of life has on an individual and opened a discussion of the Commission making recommendations that will help guide the Legislature in making policy changes. Senator Lucido supports the Commission offering policy recommendations based on the data analyzed. Mr. Bridges reminded members that the Commission's plan has been to analyze and release reports for the different grids first, identify common themes across the grids, and then the Commission will be best suited at that point to make recommendations in a final summary. Chair Caswell raised the issue of the impact specialty courts may have on conviction rates and sentencing disparity. Commissioner Kubiak noted that is a very complicated question to answer both with data and with recommendations and provided some insight into what the diversion

data they have collected found. Mr. Bridges will update the analysis of specialty courts for the E grid and include it in the Class E report. Commissioner Kaminski suggested the Commission might want to do some year-to-year comparisons once the 2018 data is available to analyze some of the program resources available in straddle cell cases. A general discussion of areas the Commission may want to consider for possible recommendations continued. The Chair made some closing remarks and asked Mr. Bridges to have the Class E report ready for the Data subcommittee to review at its next meeting so that the report will be ready for the full Commission to review at the next meeting. Mr. Bridges asked members to send him any feedback they have to the changes he made to the table on page 2 of the Executive Summary by April 9 so it can be taken up by the Data Subcommittee. Mr. Bridges concluded with a brief update on the B & C grids.

IV. Formation of Prior Record Variable (PRV)/Habitual Offender Subcommittee

The Chair proposed the formation of a Prior Record Variable (PRV)/Habitual Offender Subcommittee as discussed at a previous Commission meeting. There was no objection. The Chair appointed Commissioner Levine as Chair, and appointed Assistant Attorney General Kolodziej, Representative LaFave, Senator Santana, and Commissioner Strange as members of the subcommittee. He asked Mr. Bridges and Ms. Cavanagh to assist the subcommittee and noted that he would try to attend any scheduled subcommittee meetings, if possible.

V. Commissioner Comments

The Chair asked if there were any Commissioner comments. Representative LaFave expressed his concern regarding the incarceration of young black males for simply having a concealed weapon. Representative Robinson noted his appreciation of Representative LaFave's comments and looks forward to further examination of the concealed weapons issue. Ms. Strange added that the Commission did release a mental health recommendation about a year ago over mental health screening tools and thinks the Commission may want to follow up with the Legislature. Commissioner Kolodziej urged members to start thinking now about the human element and how to best illustrate any recommendation the Commission may make with real life examples. The Chair provided comments on the Nurse/Family Partnership program and urged members not to get discouraged. There were no other comments.

VI. Public Comments

The Chair asked if there were any public comments. Ms. Sue Stutzky, House Fiscal Agency Legislative Analyst, provided positive comments regarding the Commission's discussions. There were no other public comments.

VII. Next CJPC Meeting Date

The next CJPC meeting is scheduled for **Wednesday, May 1, 2019, at 9:00 a.m.** The location for the meeting is to be determined and will be announced at a later date.

VIII. Adjournment

There being no further business before the Commission and seeing no objection, the Chair adjourned the meeting, the time being 11:43 a.m.





Figure 1: Average Probability of a Prison Sentence By Race, Gender, and Age





Figure 2: Average Difference in Probability between Race by Gender and Age





 - Removed OWI-3rd and Concealed Weapon crimes from the Crimes Against Public Safety crime group.

- Allow for interactions between crime group and the race, gender, and age of an offender.**





Figure 5: Probability of a Prison Sentence for Public Safety Crimes* by Race, Gender, and Age





Figure 6: Average Difference in Probability between Race for Public Safety Crimes* by Gender and Age





Figure 7: Probability of a Prison Sentence for Public Safety Crimes* by Gender, Race, and Age





Figure 8: Average Difference in Probability between Gender for Public Safety Crimes* by Race and Age





Figure 9: Probability of a Prison Sentence for OWI – 3rd Convictions by Race, Gender, and Age





Figure 12: Average Difference in Probability between Race for Concealed Weapon Convictions by Gender and Age


