The Part 1 proposed rule set (2023-11 EQ) will revise and add additional  
definitions needed to support revisions done in subsequent rule parts  
developed to fulfill the federal Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq  
(CAA). The proposed rules add additional definitions to further support  
and clarify the Michigan Air Pollution Control Rules, as well as revise  
existing definitions for "Carcinogens" and exemptions for "Volatile  
organic compounds" (VOCs) and "Toxic air contaminant" definitions  
to align with the United States Environmental Protection Agency's  
(USEPA) regulatory definitions and toxics research findings.

The Part 8 proposed rule set (2023-13 EQ) contains rules developed to  
fulfill CAA requirements for sources of oxides of nitrogen (NOx). Michigan  
must create new rules to address a change to a moderate classification  
in nonattainment areas under provisions of the National Ambient Air  
Quality Standards (NAAQS). These rules are often referred to as NOx  
"Reasonably Available Control Technologies" (RACT). For past NAAQS,  
EGLE was not required to promulgate RACT rules for NOx sources in  
the nonattainment areas established under those standards. With the  
establishment of a new standard and a new classification, Michigan must  
create RACT rules to align with requirements of Section 182(b)(2) of the  
CAA. EGLE must promulgate new rules setting emission standards and  
operational requirements for certain types of NOx emission sources for  
the nonattainment areas. Additionally, existing Part 8 Rules addressing  
the "NOx State Implementation Plan (SIP) Call" federal program will be  
modified to address minor improvements suggested by representatives  
of the USEPA.

The Part 9 proposed rule set (2023-014 EQ) will revise and incorporate  
additional adopted standards to support revisions pending or completed  
in other rule parts developed to fulfill the ozone requirements under  
the CAA. The proposed revisions also consist of updates to reference  
prices to align with what is currently offered by the respective sources,  
including the AQD; and revisions to the publication dates referenced,  
the physical and web addresses listed in the rule to reflect the current  
information, and availability of these reference materials from their  
respective agencies.

If approved, the rules will be submitted to the USEPA as an amendment  
to the Michigan State Implementation Plan (SIP). Revisions being  
submitted to the SIP include the following: Part 1 revisions related to rule  
definitions associated with other Michigan administrative SIP approved  
rules, Part 8 revisions related to NOx RACT as a component of the West  
Michigan attainment SIP for the 2015 ozone NAAQS and additional  
revisions as improvements to an earlier submittal addressing the NOx  
SIP call, Part 9 revisions that support various Michigan administrative  
SIP approved rules and update reference language for consistency  
between state and SIP approved versions of various Part 9 rules. The  
comment period and hearing will fulfill requirements contained in the  
state administrative public participation rules and the CAA.



## A work bee with butterflies

IRON MOUNTAIN – It will be more than raking and hauling debris at the Lake Antoine Park Partners' annual spring clean-up on Saturday, April 27.

LAPP will unveil two new art installations on the beach house.

The work bee starts at 9 a.m., with a formal dedication of the crafted butterfly displays at 10 a.m. at the former concession stand on the lakeshore. Refreshments will be served.

Local artists Mathew Dault and Dan Recla were commissioned to do the unique butterfly pieces as part of the Sunset Beach project.

Both veterans will be on site Saturday to talk about their completed artwork with the public.

"This art is an important part of our Sunset Beach project that will take at least two years to fund and manpower," said Ann Hruska, LAPP treasurer and project chairman. "We will be anxious to talk with the public about those plans that have been in the works for months now."

Over the winter, Dault worked on the colorful mural that is now hung on the north wall, the location of the former exterior showers.

"You can see it from Lake Antoine Road as you are coming around the lake," she said.

Hruska noted that Dault designed the weather-protected piece so it could be mounted to the concrete wall, which has deep ridges that made the surface unsuitable for painting. His medium is acrylic paint on gesso-primed canvas.

Dault's artwork can be seen throughout the county, including the waiting room of a local oil-changing business.

"He incorporated surprises within the mural – it's going to be kind of a game of 'Can you find this?'" Hruska said.

The interactive mural will make for a fun and colorful backdrop, she added.

Dault says his overall goal is to inspire people through his artwork.

He was an English teacher in Vietnam for 10 years and now calls the U.P. home.

Recla's metal sculptures will be displayed across on the shore wall to enhance the view.

The flight features various sizes of detailed, three-dimensional butterflies.

"He surprised us by making an 8-by-5-foot butterfly that people can stand next to and have their pictures taken," Hruska said.

"They are beautiful," she said. "Even cooler than I had anticipated."

Recla has worked in metal for most of his life and began making "cool" things from smashed car fenders and doors. He would give them away to his friends. His pieces were dubbed "folk metal art" by family members.

That began a brand-new adventure creating interesting and unusual metal sculptures.

The LAPP worked more than a year to obtain an artist for a mural, Hruska said.

"We definitely found the right people," Hruska adds. "We are pretty excited about it."

The idea for butterfly pieces came after they added the butterfly garden on the west side of the beach house. "It is a very sunny place, but there was nothing else there to draw you to that area," she said.

"We thought this would be something natural and pretty, as well as inexpensive."

The LAPP members were pleased as well to have a project done ahead of schedule.

Construction work on the Sunset Beach project will continue at the end of the summer.

"That whole area will be further developed – it's kind of morphing," Hruska said.

Volunteers are needed for the community-wide project from 9 a.m. to noon.

In addition to raking and clean up, they plan to do pruning, mulching and spruce up planted areas of the park. The electric will be turned on in the campsites for those wishing to bring a leaf blower.

Hruska noted they have a variety of tasks to accomplish that will keep all busy no matter the skill set. Those willing to help don't have to stay for the entire duration of the clean-up event, she added.

"Come bring your gloves and rakes to clean up the grounds to get ready for the Memorial Day opening," said Allison Lucier, LAPP president. "And we are always looking for new ideas for happenings at the park. If you have ideas on how folks can enjoy this park, please come to our work bee and talk with us."

The work bee is a great opportunity as well for high school students to do hours.

If needed, a second work bee is slated from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, May 4.

LAPP will also have a soft launch of its new "membership drive" during the event on Saturday. Forms will be available for anyone interested in joining their efforts.

"We want the community to feel more of a part of what's going on at the park," she said.

The official drive is planned to coincide with the LAPP's next monthly meeting at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 1, at the Breitung Township Hall in Quinnesec. Refreshments will be served.

The LAPP is now accepting registration for the seventh-annual Crafty Flea Market planned Sept. 7 at the campsites.

Their non-profits mission is to preserve, improve, promote and protect Lake Antoine Park in Dickinson County, for the use and benefit of the general public.

## Live music to play larger role in Escanaba this summer

ESCANABA – Plans are being made to grow established city festivals in Escanaba by adding more music. Organizers say it will greatly enhance the community.

"Music adds vibrancy to a community," said Lorne Watson, a member of the Escanaba Recreation Advisory Board who established an Escanaba Live Music Series committee to improve several city music festivals. "We are looking to improve music in Escanaba as a way to grow our community."

The committee, which includes the city's Recreation Department and the Escanaba Downtown Development Authority, is making plans for Marina Fest, Rock the Dock, Escanaba Labor Day Celebration with the Delta County Trades and Labor Council and Lake Shore Live established by the late Nick Nolde. It also includes a revamped Summer of Melodies music series.

"Music is something that can really bring a community together. Something fun like a polka, a nice listening band, the city band, things like that. It's a gathering for people," said Sue Parker, chair of the Escanaba DDA.

The DDA is funding the additional music and seeking sponsors for the events. The city Recreation Department is working with vendors and providing facilities and event activities.

The focus this year is on local bands. ELMS committee member Kevin Chown says the goal is to build up the local music talent.

"That is the theme for me personally, is make this the year of making the most of what we have to work with, which is a lot of talent," he said. "There's an incredible amount of musicians here for the size of the city."

The band line ups will

be announced in May. The music festivals include Marina Fest on July 27 at the Escanaba Harbor, Rock the Dock on Aug. 3 and Escanaba Labor Day Celebration on Sept. 2 at the Escanaba Municipal Dock and Lake Shore Live on Sept. 14 at the Escanaba Marketplace.

Saturday events at the Karas Bandshell will be held July 6, 13 and Aug. 10.

"I'm excited about the new music scene this year. Hopefully, we see more people coming out for it

and enjoy it like I do," said Mike Canull, a local musician and emcee for Rock the Dock and Labor Day.

The increased music is on top of other musical events planned throughout the summer.

The Bonifas Arts Center sponsors the Music Mondays, the Escanaba Public Library has the Live on the Lawn music series and the Escanaba DDA sponsors Lunch on Ludington at the Escanaba Marketplace with Blues for a Cause.

The DDA also sponsors the Escanaba Beat street

concerts each month and Radio Results Network is holding its annual block party on July 26.

The DDA is also planning a polka concert July 5 at the Karas Bandshell and other summer music on Ludington Street.

And, the Escanaba City Band is celebrating its 100th anniversary with Wednesday concerts in Ludington Park. A big event will be held at its July 24 concert.

"There is going to be an insane amount of music in this town," Chown said.
