Mysterious death has police stumped, failing seeking answers

Morgan Carr was found dead May 4 in the southbound lane of Marathon Road in Lapeer County's Oregon Township.

Morgan Carr. Carr-Deming's nephew. was 26 years old.

He was someone she described as indest ructible, larger than life.

She was getting dressed, preparing to start her day and on the phone with her daughter when the first call from her father came.

Being that she was already on the phone with someone, Carr-Deming ignored the

When he called again 30 seconds later, she figured it might be worth picking up.
"I was like. "What?" she continued. "It

She described falling apart denying the words her father had just spoken to ber rere real. He had to be wrong, Carr-Dent-

"I'll be honest," she told MLive-The Flint Journal. "It's been a month, and it still feels like still not quite real."

'FULL OF LIFE'

"Morgan was a wonderful kid."
Carr-Deming said, acknowledging that
since he was 26, it was allly to call him a
kid. "He had hellfire wild-a" charm. That was how I always described him. He was furney and he was full of life."

He also stood out in a crowd, Carr-Dem-

He also stood out in a crowd. Carr-Deming said — Carr stood about 6 foot 8 inches tall and weighed about 220 pounds.
Growing up. Carr took to the outdoors. He liked hunting, fishing and was "always outside," according to Carr-Deming. He had been training his dog to be a duck hunting dog and loved looking for more! mush process. mushrooms.

Care olways wanted to make people laugh — even at an early age and some-times at the expense of others, Care Dem-

We went to the Michigan State Fair. and you know the salt and pepper shakers that you ride," she remembered. "Nobody would ride that with him, so, finally I was like. 'OK, I'll go with you.' And he kept rocking them on purpose."

Care's aunt eventually had to tell him to stop or else she was going to throw up. "He thought that was the funniest thing even," she said.

With his height and being the eldest of the grandkids in the Carr family, Carr's ousins looked up to him — literally and

Those who knew him said he loved Those who knew him said he loved spending time with his family, his friends and that they had never met a person who didn't like the young daredevil.

A 2016 Lapeer High School graduate, Carralways considered himself a Lapeer West kid—not one of those east siders.

WHAT HAPPENED MAY 4?

Carr was found dead in the southbound lane of Marathon Road, west of Klam Road.

in Lapeer County's Oregon Township.
Police responded to the scene and found his body after a passing motorist on their way to work called 911 to report seeing a man in the roadway.

He was pronounced dead at the scene afterlife-saving measures were attempted.

Police said Carr's injuries and the scene - absent of any evidence of a vehicle being involved in his death - called the situation into question.

An autopsy determined his cause of death was an injury to a vital organ, but there were no broken bones or other char-acteristics common with pedest nans being struck by a vehicle.

Using a breakdown of witness state-ments and surveillance video, police have narrowed the time of Care's death to some where between 12:28 and 1:36 a.m. May 4.

He met friends late in the evening May 3. They went to an establishment in Lapeer and then left, going to Columbiaville

Carr got into an argument and left the establishment in Columbiaville at 11:47 p.m. He walked south on Marathon Road, toward his home.

Several motorists reported seeing Care walking north of Zemmer Road, within the curves, just after midnight.

The last motorist to report seeing him said he was walking south on Marathon Road, south of Mount Morris Road, at 12:28 a.m. May 4.

Care's body was found about 2 miles south of Mount Morris Road at 1:36 a.m. He was less than 5 miles south of Columbiaville, about 1.5 miles away from his

Police are still trying to determine what happened between 12:28 a.m. and 1:36 a.m. that morning between Mount Morris and

Klam Roads on Marathon Road.

A pickup without a topper was seen driving on the roadway about 1.14 a.m. Video enhancement is being explored, but police did not provide any additional information on the truck. Police are trying to identify and interview the driver.

As of June 6, police have no new leads in

the investigation, according to the Lapeer County Sheriff's Office.

SOMEBODY KNOWS

Carr Denting has been vocal on social media, sharing photos of her nephew and news articles about his death.

She is hoping to keep his name alive amil someone comes forward with some-

"I really truly believe somebody knows what happened," she said.
At first, Carr-Deming said the family believed they would learn what happened

quickly. Someone would see or hear some-thing and come forward. But that hasn't happened.

They're also left wondering what hap-pened to Carr — something police are also still asking.

"I'm still hoping and praying that it was just a simple accident. I mean, that's what you want it to be," she said. "But then as time passes you start to question more things and ask more questions and get a le bit angeler. 'At the same time, I think that's also

part of the grieving process, but it's been a little hard," she continued. "I just keep praying and hoping that someone does the right thing and steps forward and lets us know what happened. "For my family, this is the most horrific

nightmare you could ever, ever imagine. You don't ever think something like that know it doesn't bring him back, at least it gives test to your brain tobe able to at least know what happened."

She said she offered to be the spokesperson for the family during this time because

Carr's parents were not ready to speak about their son as often after she has to the numerous TV cameras and other plat-

forms that have covered his case.

"If I'm hurting the way I am, they're hurting 600 times more." Carr-Deming

In the month since Carr's death, the family has been continuously reminded of his absence at every family function.

He's not there for traditional events, like Lapeer's annual swing out, where gradu-ates walk downtown to applause from family and friends.

I think I just want (the public) to know that, honestly, it's the most painful thing you can go through," she said. "And if you have heard anything, or know anything. there isn't any information that's too

A Justice for Morgan Carr GoFundMe created by Carr-Deming at gofundme. com/f/justice-for-morgan-reward-fund has mised nearly \$6,000, but the family said it has also received cash donations. bringing the total to around \$15,000. They hope it will help emice someone to come forward with some sort of information about what happened.
"I hate the idea that sometimes it takes

money to motivate people, but if that's what it takes, I will raise \$15,000 more." she said. "I would do whatever it took to find out what happened."

Seven people were shot at a party in Methuen. Massachusetts, and eight people were shot during a Juneteenth celebration in Round Rock, Texas, Two people were killed

Authorities said Nash drove to suburban Rochester Hillson Saturday and opened fire at a splash padin a city park about 5 p.m. The sheriff said Nash fired as many as

28 times, stopping several times to reload.
In the chaos. "people were falling, getting hit, trying to run," Bouchard said.
"Terrible things that unfortunately all of us in our law enforcement business have

seen way too much."

The gunman was "apparently in no rush. Just calmiy walked back to his car," the sheriff said.

Nine people were injured, including an 8-year-old boy who was abot in the head; his 4-year-old brother, who was shot in the leg; and the boys' mother, who was wounded in the abdomen and leg.

The 8-year-old boy and the mother were both litted in critical condition on Saturday.

both listed in critical condition on Saturday evening. The 4-year-old was in stable con-dition. The six other victims, all at least 30 years old, were in stable condition on Saturyears old, were in a nine condition on satur-day night. Huber, the sheriff's spokesper-son, said all the victims' conditions were unchanged as of Sunday morning. Nash eventually fled but apparently left his gun behind. Investigators were able to

use the weapon's registration information to track him back to the home in Shelby Township he shared with his mother When police arrived, they found a car that matched the gunman's vehicle.

Deputies sucrounded the home and

eventually entered to find the suspect was dead. Bouchard said the man died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Deputies discovered a handgun next to the body and a semiautomatic rifle on the kitchen table. Bouchord said Saturday that Nash may have been planning a "second chap-

to the shooting. Nash's neighbors told the Detroit News that Nash's father died two years ago, and he lived with his mother, who has been

he lived with his mother, who has been traveling the United States.

"He's a loner. The blinds are always pulled over there," neighbor Kyleen Duchene told the newspaper.

Nash's mother was "super friendly and nice" but Nash himself meely left the house, neighbor Alex Roser said.

"And when he did, he didn't even say
"hi' back to us when we would acknowledge him." Roser said. "He was very quiet
and didn't want to be a part of our com-

Bouchard said that Nash had no con-

Bouchard said that Nash had no connections to the splash pad or any of the
victims. Investigators are trying to determine whether he left behind any writings
and will examine his electronic devices
in bopes of shedding light on his motive.

"In terms of the 'why.' I don't know,"
Bouchard said.

"I love my community and my heart
breaks today," Rochester Mayor Bryan
Barnett said. "When I got on scene, I
started to cry because I know what a
splash pad is supposed to be. It's supposed to be a place where people gather,
where families make memories, where
people have fun."

Billerud scraps plans to convert Escanaba mill

ESCANABA planned conversion of the Escanaba paper mill to produce cartonboard, a packaging material found in items like cereal boxes, was scrapped Tuesday, Billerud

"We have decided on a new direction to transform our production in the U.S. towards packaging materials, and one part of that means that we will not move forward with the planned and original cartonboard conversion in Escanaba," said Ivar Vante, president and CEO of Billerud, during a conference call with media and financial analysts.

The reasons for the expansion being canceled were financial, according to Vante, who said the investment level needed for the conversion for the mill was significantly higher than the Swedish-based company's ingoing projections. When asked to elaborate on the cause of the financial pressures, Vante said it was primarily an issue of inflation raising the cost of equipment and services needed for the project but confirmed the weakness of the Swedish krona to the U.S. dollar also played a

Vante stressed that Billerud would continue to shift the to producing packaging materials in North America, but would do so incrementally, at a different pace, and with more modest investments than the original plan for the Escanaba mill.

Billerud's stock, which is traded on the Stockholm Exchange, jumped more than 12% Tuesday, following the announcement.

"For us, there's not even an option to talk about Billerud moving forward without Billerud North America (as) part of this. We've been so impressed since we took over two years ago how the cultural fit has been, performance that we've been able to see quarter after quarter, and also the access to cost-competitive fiber we see in that very good, central U.S. location," said Vante.

Vante was unable to provide a detailed plan of how the company would transition to packaging materials or a when those transitions would take place. However, he was able to provide some idea of how the company's North American assets might be used towards that goal.

"I think you need to at this point start looking at the different assets, you know, machine for machine. I think Quinnesec mill, for us that's the flagship, it's the crown jewel of our North American business. That is a very, very good machine,' said Vante.

Currently, the Quinnesec mill produces coated graphic papers. Vante said having exposure to the graphic maket was still a "good match" for Billerud, but that the company was exploring how to make specialty papers on that machine to

in the graphic paper market. Early test runs on that machine of uncoated papers that could be used for packaging liners has resulted strong customer feedback,

according to Vante. The three Escanaba paper machines - known individually as E1, E3, and E4 - could have different applications under the new plan. E3, which currently produces specialty paper, is the most likely machine to continue in its current use.

"Speciality, I think, fits our portfolio like a hand in a glove. That is in a growing market, and we have good plans, and definitely that is in our strategic sweet spot going forward," said Vante.

Vante suggested smaller E1 could be used for graphic paper, low-grammage cartonboard, or some form of kraft paper. The future of the E4 machine is less certain, but it may receive modifications to allow it to produce container board in combination with graphic papers.

"We just need a bit more time to review all the options on how the plan and the sequence will pan out on the E4," said Vante.

The original expansion plan was highly subsidized by both state and local governments.

In late 2022, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) announced that the Billerud paper mill had been approved to be designated a compensate for the decline "Forest Products Processing Renaissance Zone." Biller-ud's approval for the FP-PRZ, which was to be valid for a period of 15 years, was expected to result in approximately \$1.96 million worth of abated property taxes annually to support the expansion project. Over the course of the FPPRZ period, that would have resulted in a savings for the mill of \$29.4

million. Further tax abatements by Delta County, Wells Township and Escanaba Township through the Plant Rehabilitation and Industrial Development Districts Act (Public Act 198 of 1974) were also approved, and were expected to result in \$657,000 over 12 years, based on a 50% property tax abatement to support the plant's revitalization.

The largest boost to the proposed project, however, came from Whitmer and the state legislature, which approved \$200 million to support the project in the state budget for 2023. The funds were part of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) appropriations for the year. A celebration kicking off the project was held at the mill on July 11, 2023, during which the \$200 million grant agreement between Billerud and the MEDC was signed.

Vante did not mention the county or township tax abatements during his call Tuesday, but said Billerud's change of direction likely took the state's subsidies off the table.

"It's very reasonable to assume that this grant or the discussions that we've had in Michigan state is off the table. We are very thankful for all of the support and the, let's call it, very, very good discussions that we've had with all of the Michigan state over the years, but I think that the base assumption is that this is off the table with our new plan," he

While Vante spoke highly of its North American operations since it first purchased the mills formerly owned by Verso two years ago, the Escanaba mill has had a rough few years. In 2023, 118 cases of blastomycosis, a fungal respiratory infection, were identified in mill workers or contractors. Fourteen people were reported to have been hospitalized by Public Health Delta and Menominee Counties as a result of the

outbreak; one person, a contractor at the mill, died from the disease; and the mill was idled for three weeks for deep cleaning.

"Although we have not found a direct link to the worksite, many fell ill and we are deeply saddened by the death of a person who worked as a contractor at the mill," the company wrote in its 2023 annual report.

Later in 2023, the mill was subject to short-term layoffs, which occurred at multiple mills across Billerud's holdings, including in Europe. The layoffs in Escanaba were attributed to reduced paper demands and a need to manage inventory levels efficiently.

Currently, only two North American mills are in Billerud's portfolio, the Escanaba and Quinnesec mills. The company divested of its mill in Wisconsin Rapids, Wis. in March. That mill had been idled since 2020 but was once in contention for the expansion that was planned in Escanaba.

Despite selling the mill land and equipment to a private equity firm, Billerud has kept an active conversion facility in Wisconsin
